"You're a Grand Old Flag" was written by George M. Cohan for his 1906 stage musical, <u>George Washington, Jr.</u>, as a tribute to the United States flag. The song was introduced to the public in the play's first act on opening night, February 6, 1906, in New York's Herald Square Theater. It was the first song from a musical to sell over a million copies of sheet music. It has gone on to be one of the most popular American marching-band pieces of all time. In 1942, the spirited song was sung solo by James Cagney in the now-classic movie, "Yankee Doodle Dandy."

The original lyric came from an encounter George Cohan had with a Civil War veteran who fought at Gettysburg. The two men found themselves next to each other and Cohan noticed the vet held a carefully folded but ragged old flag. The man reportedly then turned to Cohan and said, "She's a grand old rag." Cohan thought it was a great line and originally named his tune "You're a Grand Old Rag." So many groups and individuals objected to calling the flag a "rag," however, that he "gave 'em what they wanted" and switched words, renaming the song "You're a Grand Old Flag."

"This is My Country" is an American Patriotic song composed in 1940. It has played at the end of Walt Disney World and Disneyland fireworks shows. The song is made notable by the fact that it honors both Americans by birth and choice. The first chorus reads: This is my country, land of my birth; this is my country, grandest on Earth. Our choral arrangement does not include the second chorus, which originally read: "This is my country, land of my choice. This is my country, hear my proud voice." Both versions join at the ending: "I pledge thee my allegiance, America the bold, for this is my country, to have and to hold."

America, I Give My Thanks to You! American Patriotic Song

"America, I Give My Thanks to You" uses a new tune paired with one of the most beloved songs ever written for our country, "My Country, 'Tis of Thee," also known as "America," whose lyrics were written by Samuel Francis Smith, but the melody is much older and has been used for songs in many countries. "'Tis" is an old-fashioned contraction of "it is"; today we use "it's" instead. And "thee" is the Old-English for "you." So, by itself, it means "My country, it's about you."

This song was first sung in public on July 4, 1831, at a children's concert at the Park Street Church, Boston, and published in 1832.

The song's melody is the same as that of the National Anthem of the United Kingdom, "God Save the Queen." Before the "Star-Spangled Banner" became America's official anthem in 1931, "My Country 'Tis of Thee" served as one of the de facto national anthems for the United States.
