A La Ru, A La MeTraditional Spanish Carol Arranged by Douglas E. Wagner

Douglas E. Wagner's song "A La Ru, A La Me" is a musical arrangement of a traditional Spanish Christmas lullaby. The lyrics express a mother's tender love and comfort for her baby, traditionally understood to be the Virgin Mary singing to the baby Jesus. Douglas Wagner's choral setting emphasizes its gentle, mostly unison melody with echoed phrases.

The title phrase "A la ru, a la me" and similar variations ("A la rorro niño") are common refrains in Spanish-language lullabies. They are essentially musical, non-lexical phrases like "hush-a-bye" or "rock-a-bye. "Wagner based his work on a traditional Spanish carol, so it is often performed during the Christmas season. The lyrics reference the Nativity story, including the infant Jesus and the threat posed by King Herod. In the traditional text, the mother promises her child safety, assuring him he doesn't need to fear King Herod. This offers a powerful message of maternal love and divine protection.

The significance of "Edelweiss," from the musical *The Sound of Music*, is its symbolic representation of patriotism, resilience, and farewell to Austria during the rise of Nazi rule. Though widely mistaken for a traditional Austrian folk song, it was written specifically for the stage production by American composers Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II. Rodgers and Hammerstein were an influential, innovative, and successful American musical theater writing team. Together they wrote a string of musicals that initiated the Golden Age of musical theater.

The flower Edelweiss symbolizes purity, courage, devotion, and the rugged beauty and resilience of the Alps. Its name, meaning "noble white" in German, reflects its pristine appearance and symbolizes its elevated cultural status. Historically, it represented loyalty and true love, with men risking their lives to collect it for their beloved, and it became a symbol for military units, hikers, and national pride in Alpine regions.

This famous Christmas carol is about the joy of Christmas bells. The words are an impressionistic interpretation of the original melody, which Wilhousky thought sounded like ringing bells. The lyrics celebrate the joy and cheer of the Christmas season. The ringing bells announce the arrival of Christmas to everyone, both "young and old, meek and bold". The song suggests "throwing cares away" in favor of the happiness and "good cheer" of the holiday season. The bell's joyful tone extends to every home.

The original melody of "Carol of the Bells" comes from a Ukrainian folk chant called *Shchedryk*, derived from the Ukrainian word *shchedryj*, which means "bountiful". Ukrainian composer Mykola Leontovych created a choral arrangement of the melody in 1916. *Shchedryk* is a "well-wishing song" for the coming of spring and a prosperous new year. The original lyrics tell the story of a swallow flying into a home to sing a prophecy of good fortune for the master of the house. In Ukraine, the song is currently sung on New Year's Eve.
